On behalf of the Board of Directors, I have the pleasure and honor to welcome you to the 93rd annual **Michigan Safety Conference**. We bring together nearly 2,000 attendees, 200+ vendors, and offer more than 120 educational programs to increase the skill and knowledge of safety professionals from across the State of Michigan. I would like to acknowledge and thank the nearly 170 volunteers who work collaboratively to organize and deliver a world class conference.



Our conference theme this year is **STCKY**—stuff that could kill you. Despite our best efforts as safety professionals, we continue to see serious injuries and fatalities (SIF) at alarming levels across the State of Michigan. Each one of these is a tragedy and causes an unforgettable loss, impacting a family forever.

To prevent SIF events, we need to engage the workforce. They are the “masters of the blue”, and know the reality of how work is completed (vs. planned). Engaging them to understand the scope and nature of the work, identifying the job steps, hazards, and controls is crucial. The most critical step is hazard recognition, which generally involves a source of energy which must be identified and assessed.

To engage in dialogue with the workers, we can use the 4-D model, asking them what they are asked to do that is dumb, difficult, different, or dangerous. As safety practitioners, we can learn by talking with those who are closest to the work.

We also need to be up-front and transparent and have dialogue about “stopping a job” when something is not quite right. Our instincts can be a guide, and we should only begin work “when ready”, including having our “heads in the game” mentally.

We can never give up on our resolve as safety professionals to impact SIF's and do everything possible every day to prevent them from occurring. We must have a mindset to not only address, but conquer a victory in preventing them. Families are depending on us to return their loved ones home safe every day. It is a conquest and we must have a mindset of “never give up” to prevent them from occurring.

In a spirit of continuous improvement, we are adding several new things to our conference, including an industry tour on Monday afternoon before the conference begins. We have also expanded our exhibit hours to maximize the time participants can spend with vendors, and are adding a dedicated break on Tuesday afternoon to grab a snack and spend time with vendors and exhibitors. This is an excellent opportunity to view new tools and technologies, speak with the exhibitors to learn fresh ideas, and network with fellow safety professionals.

Once again, I am delighted to welcome you to our conference and look forward to your participation.

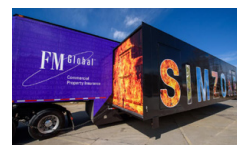

Each person needs to register with a unique email address in order to access the Mobile App. Attendees will receive instructions on how to log in to the Mobile App in March 2024. Your CEUs will be tied to this unique email.

You will need to download the **Michigan Safety Conference Mobile App** from the app store. All CEUs must be recorded in the Mobile App in order to receive credit (no paper forms). You will receive the CEU check-in code for each class at the end of each class.

If you don't have a digital device at the event to record your credits, please stop in the **Michigan Safety Conference** headquarters office at the event, and one of the staff there can assist you.

CEU Information



ALL CEUS WILL NEED TO BE APPLIED FOR DIGITALLY THROUGH THE EVENT MOBILE APP

When you log in to create your profile on the mobile app you will need to choose whether you would like to receive:

- CEU — General Email Certificate
- CEU — Formal Grand Valley State University Certificate
- CEU — Wastewater Certificate

You must choose "Yes" or "No" to each. Then you will need to check-in on the mobile app for each class that you attend. (The room monitor will give you the check-in code at the end of each class).

CSP

The Board of Certified Safety Professionals will allow one credit towards maintenance of certification for a two-day attendance at the Michigan Safety Conference. A half credit can be earned by attending one day. CSPs will be responsible for documenting their own attendance.

CIH

Certified Industrial Hygienists can earn CM points at a rate of a) claim 3 hours for each half day of attendance, or b) 0.167 CM point per each hour of technical content in the CM areas of IH, Safety, or IH Ethics (if ethics course offered). Fractional points are allowed once the one-hour minimum is achieved for IH or Safety events (e.g. 1.5 hrs = 0.25 CM point). *Excludes* the non-technical portions such as generic welcome speeches, participant introductions, breaks, meals, networking, exhibitor time, roundtables or discussions with unspecified topics, and/or social tours.

CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS — GENERAL

All divisions will offer CEUs through Grand Valley State University for attendance at their programs.

CHSP

The International Board of Certification of Safety Managers will recognize one contact hour of continuing education for each one hour break-out session for the CHSP designation.

NREP

Individuals certified by the National Registry of Environmental Professionals are allowed to apply CEUs obtained through documented attendance at the Michigan Safety Conference to NREPs continuing education requirements.

CRSP

BCRSP has awarded attendance at the Michigan Safety Conference 1.0 CMPs. Call the headquarters office to obtain the CMP approval code. MCPs are accrued by Canadian Registered Safety Professionals who are certified by the Board of Canadian Registered Safety Professionals.

DIPLOMATE ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERS

The American Academy of Environmental Engineers will recognize participation in the Michigan Safety Conference as a legitimate continuing education activity for its Diplomates (certified engineers).

PROFESSIONAL EMERGENCY MANAGER (PEM)

The Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division will accept a certificate of attendance from the Michigan Safety Conference for the "Attend a Relevant Conference" Annual Continuing EM Participation credit, for the Professional Emergency Manager designation.

WASTEWATER CEC

The State of Michigan, Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy will recognize .1 CEC per class attended (up to one total over two days). To obtain the certificate, select Wastewater CEU on the mobile app when you log in to your profile, and then be sure to check-in on the mobile app for each class you attend.
